Complete physical

- Schedule a complete physical at the time of adoption to check for internal and external parasites and overall wellbeing
- Sign up for pet insurance right away—this will maximize your coverage by avoiding pre-existing exclusions

Vaccinations

 Kittens need vaccinations every 3-4 weeks until they're 16 weeks of age

Nutrition

- ▼ A kitten's diet can impact her lifelong health
- Provide the nutrients necessary for development with quality food specifically made for kittens

Housebreaking

- ▼ Rule of thumb: One litter box per cat, plus one to spare
- Developing appropriate cat scratching behaviors is important to establish boundaries

Identification

- ▼ Kittens are curious explorers, but not always the best navigators
- Provide an ID tag and microchip; if your kitty gets out, these may be the only chance of finding home

Safety first

- Curiosity and the tendency to chew can lead to serious risks
- Remove toxic plants, meds and foods
- Provide chew-safe toys
- Use electrical cord protectors
